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STAFF NEWS

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LONG HOURS SPENT IN FORMAL SESSION and numerous official functions after work combined to make the thirty-first annual meetings in Manila a very busy time for all concerned. Considerable praise was voiced for the generous hospitality provided by the Philippine Government, and for the magnificent new International Convention Center constructed by the Government in time for the meetings. The Center was built on reclaimed land reaching into Manila Bay as part of a complex which also includes the equally splendid Cultural Center and the Folk Arts Theater. It proved to be more than adequate for the needs of the meetings, with its handsome Plenary Hall, seating 4,300 persons, adjoining reception hall and connected Secretariat Building. So too did hotel accommodations in Manila.

Two main themes dominated the meetings - first, the need on domestic fronts for a restoration of price stability and control of inflation and, second, the priority that should be given in the international monetary sphere to balance of payments adjustment. These themes were emphasized by the Managing Director in his opening address on Monday, October 4. They were also stressed by the Chairman of the meetings, Mohammad Imady of Syria, in his concluding summary remarks on Friday, October 8. Earlier, at a joint press conference with Mr. Witteveen following the Interim Committee's meeting on Saturday, October 2, Chairman Willy De Clercq of Belgium explained that "the adjustment process is both urgent and opportune in present circumstances" and said that the Interim Committee agreed that "deficit countries should arrange their domestic policy so as to permit a shift of resources to the external sector, while industrial countries in strong payments positions should ensure continued adequate expansion in domestic demand."

Many countries emphasized the need for a prompt ratification of the Second Amendment to the Fund's Articles. In this connection a warm welcome was given to the action of the U.S. Congress in approving the Amendment, which was announced to the press in Manila by the Managing Director on October 2. Later in the month President Ford signed into law the bill containing the Amendment.



For many developing countries, including the Philippines, an important additional concern of the meetings was the debate on the important task of providing concessional aid to developing countries, which included the subject of the future resources and lending policies of the World Bank. In this area too, the atmosphere was generally one marked by conciliation, with the developing countries frequently expressing their own continued interest in the health of the industrial economies.

On Wednesday, October 6, the Interim Committee selected Mr. De Clercq to be its Chairman, while the Joint Fund/World Bank Development Committee selected the Philippines' Finance Secretary, Cesar E. A. Virata, to succeed Henri Konan-Bédié, Minister of Economy and Finance of Ivory Coast, as its Chairman. The Development Committee also appointed Sir Richard King of the United Kingdom as its Executive Secretary.

The reception provided by the Philippine authorities began at the airport, where a special lounge had been established to welcome arriving delegates and staff members. After being greeted by a welcoming committee of beautiful hostesses dressed in "ternos", the arriving persons were eased rapidly through customs and immigration and then whisked to their hotels by a large fleet of air-conditioned Mercedes. The same thoughtfulness and consideration marked all arrangements during the week. Buses and cars were available for transportation from hotels to the Convention Center and other destinations. Much of the success of the arrangements was due to the personal interest taken in the preparations by President and Mrs. Marcos, who, in addition to appearing at the opening session, had supervised personally much of the planning.

On the evening of Sunday, October 3, a reception was given by Chairman and Mrs. Imady and Co-Chairman Sadek Ayoubi and Mrs. Ayoubi in the reception hall of the Convention Center. On the following evenings numerous receptions were given by the Philippines Government. These included a "Barrio Fiesta" presented by Mrs. Marcos at the Folk Arts Theater on Monday evening; a formal dinner hosted by President and Mrs. Marcos on Tuesday evening at Malacanang, the presidential mansion; and, on Wednesday, a reception for the press at the Manila Polo Club given by the Philippines Secretary for Information, Francisco Tatad, and Secretary for Tourism, José D. Aspiras. Following the meetings, Mr. and Mrs. Marcos took the Managing Director and Mrs. Witteveen and World Bank President Robert McNamara and Mrs. McNamara by helicopter to the famous Second World War site of Corregidor.

For those who had the time, a varied cultural feast was available in Manila during the week of the meetings. As part of a simultaneous cultural festival there were performances by the Bolshoi Ballet, the Australian Ballet with Dame Margot Fonteyn, the pianist Van Cliburn, and the soprano Montserrat Caballé. Numerous performances of Philippine music and drama were also presented by colleges and schools in the Manila area. In addition major exhibitions of Chinese art and Egyptian antiquities were on display.

A very diverse program was arranged for the ladies during their stay in Manila. This included a tour of the city of Manila; a tour of the First Lady's human development projects, consisting of the Population Center, a cooperative help center and a model resettlement community; a cultural tour, visiting the National Museum of the Philippines, the Intramuros - or old walled city - area and a private museum of oriental porcelain; a design and crafts tour; and a countryside tour, taking in the famous bamboo organ of Las Pinas, the home of Emilio Aguinaldo, the first President of the Philippines, and the Nayong Pilipino, a capsule panorama of the history and culture of the islands. The ladies were also hosted at welcoming lunches on Monday by prominent Filipino bankers and attended luncheons at the Manila Hotel and at the National Arts Center in Makiling.

Although everything turned out well, Dana Brantley, Deputy Secretary for Annual Meetings, and his staff were faced with numerous problems to be resolved in the months preceding the meetings. It was a period of heavy rainfall in the Manila area, which caused some uncertainties in the Philippine building program. The climatic conditions also produced more health problems than the staff normally encountered. Although the formal meetings only lasted five days, the arrangements for them required the presence in Manila of Mr. Brantley and some of his staff as early as May 1976 and the work of the annual meetings staff in the Philippine capital will not be finally concluded until mid-November.

A large number of Philippine assistants, carefully selected by the Philippine

authorities from banks and corporations in the Manila area, were retained for a wide variety of meetings' services and proved to be extremely efficient and cooperative. As Mr. Witteveen remarked at his final press conference on Friday, October 8: "All Filipinos, from high up to low down, have been very friendly, very kind, very nice, and have made us feel completely at home in this beautiful country."

THE MANAGING DIRECTOR was conferred the degree of Doctor of Law, honoris causa, by the University of the Philippines, at a ceremony in Manila on October 1. The same degree was also conferred on Robert S. McNamara, the President of the World Bank. In his remarks on the occasion, Mr. Witteveen traced the close relationship between the Fund and the Philippines, both in the contributions of Philippine nationals to the work of the Fund and in the balance of payments support extended by the Fund to the Philippines. He went on to take issue with those who have argued that the persistence of seemingly intractable problems of poverty demonstrated the failure of economists. "Is this a failure of economists in the practice of their profession?" he asked. "I would venture to say not... This failure to adopt what are generally recognized as sound development policies has mainly been the result of political difficulties... While the political will to overcome such difficulties is, one hopes, being strengthened, economic science and the economist can continue to play a role in identifying and fostering the right policies."



After Manila, Mr. Witteveen went to Port Moresby in Papua/New Guinea for one day before going to Australia for discussions in Sydney and Canberra. In New Zealand, following his official talks in Wellington, the Managing Director went to the South Island. He flew to Jakarta for discussions with the Indonesian authorities, and then went on to Bangkok by way of Northern Sumatra and Singapore. In Burma official discussions were held in Rangoon and a side trip was arranged to Upper Burma. Finally the Managing Director spent a few days in Nepal before proceeding back to Washington via New Delhi and Europe.

THE "THRILLA IN MANILA" attracted some 160 members of the international financial and economic press, many of them veterans of annual meetings' coverage, together with no fewer



than 320 representatives of the Philippines press. To accommodate their needs for the first time two separate press rooms were established. There was a regular press room for the writing press on the first floor of the Secretariat building. A Broadcast Media Center for radio and television reporters was set up under the direction of the Philippine Government's National Media Production Center in somewhat spartan conditions on the fourth floor of the Plenary Hall building. In addition to the press services provided by the Fund's Information Office and the Information and Public Affairs Department of the World Bank, extensive

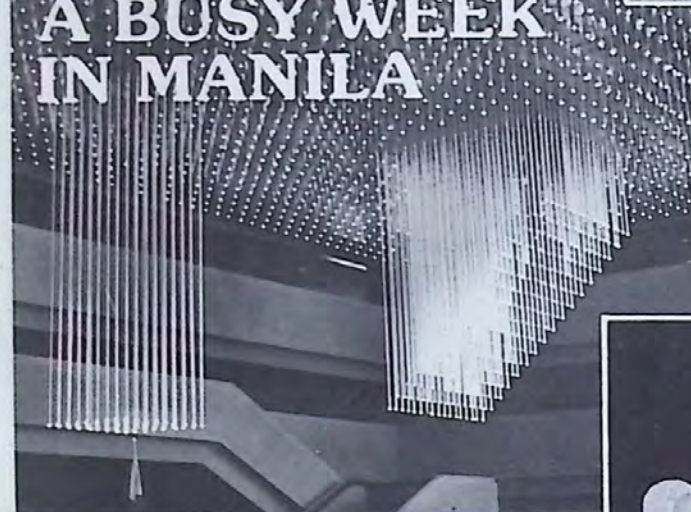
assistance was provided, especially to the Philippine press representatives, by the staff of the Philippine Press Working Group. For the first time at an annual meeting, editions of the Morning Press were produced on the Saturday and Sunday preceding the meetings, while frequently during the week of the meetings, no fewer than four editions of the Morning Press were produced daily.

The joint press conference of the Managing Director and Mr. De Clercq following the

A BUSY WEEK IN MANILA

RANDOM NOTES FROM THE MEETINGS....(photomontage by Bob Frederick; photos by Dave Beach)...

The first test of the facilities at the Philippines International Convention Center came some ten days before the annual meetings opened when several hundred representatives of the "batasang bayan", the Philippine President's advisory council, took over the Center for their sessions...colds and running noses spread like wildfire through the meetings as delegates and staff members suffered the effects of continuous transitions between the

thoroughly air-conditioned interior of the Convention Center and the steamy tropical heat outdoors...Philippine "barongs" sprouted in abundance as participants in the meetings took advantage of President Marcos's decree that Filipino attire was acceptable for all meetings and official receptions...Also numerous stores in Manila offered hefty discounts to meetings' delegates and staff members...A duty-free store in the Convention Center complex did a brisk business in Philippine materials and cigars, as well as imported goods...Security at the meetings was stricter than at any previous meetings, with all hand baggage and cameras being checked and x-rayed at the entries to the Convention Center...late one night two World Bank staff members were briefly detained by security guards and were "rescued" by representatives of the British Broadcasting Corporation... Most found the time amidst the busy schedule to sample the cuisine of the Philippine Islands, including such delicacies as Lechon (roast pork), Adobo (marinated chicken and pork) and gigantic lobsters and prawns...The youngest reporter to register with the press room was Roxas Go, aged 12, of the Manila International School's "Bamboo Bugle"...Mr. Go not only showed himself assiduous in his coverage of the meetings, but also asked the final question at Malacanang Palace during President Marcos's televised press conference... ..The location of the annual meetings in South-East Asia provided many staff members with the opportunity to combine work with subsequent vacations...Some stayed in the Philippines to visit the mountain resort of Baguio or the beaches of Cebu and Mindanao while others travelled further afield to Bangkok, Bali, Singapore and Australia...a few took the opportunity to travel on around the world.

MASANAO MATSUNAGA has been appointed Executive Director for Japan, effective November 1, to succeed Kaichi Kawaguchi.



Mr. Matsunaga (photo left) was born in 1924 and studied at the Faculty of Law of Tokyo University. Upon graduating in 1948 he joined the Ministry of Finance, where he served until 1963. After serving in the Japanese embassies in Brussels and Paris, he returned to the Ministry of Finance in 1968 as a Director in the Banking Bureau's Insurance Department, in 1970 became Director of the International Finance Bureau's International Organizations Division, and in 1971 moved to the position of Director of the Coordination Division. Appointed Director General of the Nagoya Regional Tax Administration Bureau in 1973, Mr. Matsunaga returned to the Ministry of Finance as Deputy Director-General of the International Finance Bureau in 1974 and of the Securities Bureau in 1975, a position he held until his appointment to the Board.

SIX NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS were elected at the biennial elections held during the annual meetings, and nine of the present elected Executive Directors were re-elected. The newly elected Executive Directors, who took office on November 1, are Muhammad Al-Atrash of the Syrian Arab Republic, who succeeds Nazih Ahmed Deif of Egypt; Roberto Guarnieri, succeeding Francisco Suarez of Mexico; Frede Hollesen of Denmark, succeeding Per Asbrink of Sweden; M.G. Kaul of India, succeeding S. Jagannathan, also of India; Wila d'Israeli Mung'omba of Zambia, succeeding Horace R. Monday, Jr., of The Gambia; and Samuel Nana-Sinkam of Cameroon, succeeding Antoine W. Yaméogo of Upper Volta.



Muhammad Al-Atrash, (photo right) who has been serving as an Executive Director at the World Bank, was born in



1934, received a doctorate in 1963 at the London School of Economics and served from 1963 to 1970 with the Central Bank of Syria. After being an Alternate Executive Director from 1970 to 1973, he was appointed Financial Advisor to the Arab Fund for Economic and Social Development in 1973, before returning to the Central Bank of Syria as Deputy Governor in 1974. Mr. Al-Atrash was a member of the Deputies of the Committee of 20 and also has served as an Associate of the Interim Committee.

Roberto Guarnieri (photo left) is already known at the Fund, having

served as an Alternate Executive Director since 1974. He was born in 1939 and graduated from the Central University of Venezuela in 1963. He later received a master's degree in economics from Yale University in 1966 and studied at Oxford University from 1968 to 1970. He has served in the Central Bank of Venezuela, was Special Advisor to the Venezuelan Minister of Mines and Hydrocarbons from 1971 to 1974, and Director of Economic Research in the Ministry of Finance from 1972 to 1974. He has been a Deputy of the Group of 24 developing countries.



Frede Hollensen, (photo right) who has been serving as Assistant Director of the National Bank of Denmark, was born in 1918, graduated in economics in 1943 from the University of Copenhagen and received a doctorate in 1953. He has served in the National Bank since 1943 and was promoted to Assistant Director in 1968. He has been a member of the OECD Committee on Invisible Transactions and of the EEC Committee on Capital Movements. His son Ole is a Young Professional in the African Department.



M.G. Kaul (photo left) has most recently served as Secretary of the Indian Finance Ministry. He was born in 1921, received a master's degree from Allahabad University, and joined the Indian Civil Service in 1943. After serving from 1969 as Additional Secretary in the Department of Economic Affairs of the Finance Ministry, he was promoted to Secretary in 1972. Mr. Kaul has served as a member of the Indian delegation to the United Nations General Assembly and as an Alternate Governor of the World Bank.

Wila d'Israeli Mung'omba, (photo right) who prior to coming to the Fund was a member of the Zambian Parliament, was born in 1939 and attended Makerere College, Uganda, where he received a degree in law in 1965. He later studied law at the University of London from 1965 to 1968, then, after returning to Zambia, was appointed Solicitor to the City Council of Lusaka. He became Legal and Political Advisor to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in March 1969. After serving with the Zambian mission to the United Nations, he returned home in 1970 and was elected to Parliament in 1971. He is a founding member and first secretary of the Zambian Law Association.



Samuel Nana-Sinkam (photo left) is already known in the Fund, having served as an Alternate Executive Director since 1972. He was born in 1941, received degrees from the University of Grenoble, the Institut National de Statistiques et d'Economie Appliquée, Rabat, and a doctorate in economics from the University of Poitiers. He later received a master's degree and a doctorate in economics from George Washington University. He served from 1966 to 1969 in Cameroon's Federal Ministry of Planning, from 1967 to 1970 as an economist for the Food and Agriculture Organization, and from 1970 to 1971 as an economist with the Fund. In 1971 he was appointed Technical Assistant to Mr. Yaméogo and in October 1972 was promoted to Alternate Executive Director.



MAMOUDOU TOURE, (photo right) Director, African Department, resigned from the African Department on October 31. He is succeeded in the position by Justin B. Zulu. Mr. Touré, a Mauritanian national, was born in 1928. He was educated at the University of Dakar, where he received a Licence en Droit and Certificat de Droit et Coutumes d'Outre-Mer; the University of Paris, where he was awarded a degree in public law, and doctorates in political economy and economic sciences; and the Ecole Nationale de la France d'Outre-Mer, where he was granted his diploma in 1957. From 1957 to 1958, he served in Paris as Administrateur de la France d'Outre-Mer posted to the delegation of the former French West Africa. He was then in Brussels from 1958 to 1961 as Counselor and Head of Service of the Pays et Territoires d'Outre-Mer associés at the Secretariat and the EEC Council of Ministers. From

1961 to 1962 he served again in Paris as Mauritanian Ambassador to Western Europe; from 1962 to 1963 he was in Lagos, Nigeria, as Secretary General, Technical Cooperation Commission in Africa; from 1963 to 1965 he was in New York and Paris as a consultant and then as expert for the coordination of bilateral programs of UNICEF; and from 1965 to 1966 he was Director of the African Institute for Economic Development and Planning in Dakar, Senegal. He was appointed Director of the African Department in April 1967.

TWO CERAMICISTS AND A WATERCOLORIST were featured in the Art Society exhibition which opened on September 29 in the Atrium. The ceramicists were Eleni Demetriou, who was born in Athens, and Mary R. Wolff, who comes from Chicago. The watercolorist was John J. Arcuri, a native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Mrs. Demetriou studied ceramics at the Corcoran School of Art under the Japanese master Teruo Hara, and taught ceramics there from 1969 to 1974.



At present she is on the faculty of Mount Vernon College. Mrs. Wolff began her ceramics studies at the University of Illinois and then later worked privately with Mrs. Demetriou. Among the institutions which have acquired her works is the new Air and Space Museum of the Smithsonian Institution. Mr. Arcuri studied art at the University of Wisconsin and the Layton School of Art and has regularly exhibited in Milwaukee and Madison, Wisconsin. THE CHARMING ICON-LIKE PAINTINGS of Corneliu Petrescu were the subject of the Art Society's exhibition which opened in the Atrium on October 21. Mr. Petrescu, who has exhibited at the Fund once before, was born in Slanic, Romania, in 1924 and received a doctorate in medicine from Bucharest University. He began to exhibit paintings in 1956 and later expanded his technique to include colored woodcuts. He has exhibited widely in Romania and also overseas - in Tokyo, Frankfurt, Damascus, Rome, New York and Stockholm. In 1972 he was awarded a gold medal and title of Doctor honoris causa by the Tomasso Campanella Academy in Rome.
